FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR MOIRA

Dear Merrick Family:

I am about to celebrate my 17th wedding anniversary with Forrest on February 1. We were married at James Chapel at Union Theological Seminary. It was an event where everyone pitched in. Of course, we wrote the liturgy and vows. Friends played some good oi' bluegrass music at the service and during the reception. A cousin baked the delicious wedding cake. Other friends brought flowers to grace the tables. Others contributed disposable cameras (remember those?) so people at each table could take some shots. Speaking of shots, champagne and other beverages were also gifted. It was a beautiful gathering, even Michelle, Forrest's grandmother's toy poodle, was a special guest. Wonderful memories!

In John's Gospel, Jesus' first great sign, or miracle, occurs at a wedding (2:1-12). It's seems surprising to see Jesus celebrating at a wedding. We forget Jesus laughed, enjoyed life, listened to music, and looked forward to celebrations as much as anyone else. So here he is, in Cana of Galilee, and his mother discreetly lets him know of a looming disaster: the wedding is about to run out of wine. Even for a modern day event, we can understand what a fiasco this would entail. Families have scrimped and saved to put on as lavish a feast as they could afford, which often involved the entire village and extend for as long as an entire week. To run out of wine would be a huge embarrassment. Some would doubt the reputation of the family. With compassion Mary talks to Jesus about their problem. Jesus in turn, responds tersely: "what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come."

However, as we see here in the story of the Wedding feast of Cana, Jesus does indeed take action. He instructs the servants to fill six stone jars holding 30 gallons each with water. When the Chief Steward draws the water, he is astonished and says to the bridegroom, "Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now."

Somehow even Jesus realized that this was a right time to do a good deed – saving a wedding by providing more wine. It was one of Jesus' most important miracles. It preserved the dignity of a family at a critical time of its life. It started a couple off on the right foot. It allowed a community to continue to celebrate, even in the midst of typical first-century hard life.

February is the "month of love" with Valentine 's Day around the corner. Let us remember this month that Jesus died to show us the path to love. Whether we are married or not, we are pledged to love.

This is the mission of the Church – to love well. So, let us pitch in and give our very best. We discover in giving our best that our hour to do good is now, after all.

SOUPER BOWL CHALLENGE 2020!

The SOUPERBOWL CHALLENGE of 2020 is ON!!! Are you ready to



rumble?!?!? (Oops, wrong sport.) Okay...are you ready to help feed the homeless right here in our community?

We all know that times are tough out there, and a hot meal can make all the difference in the world for a family in need. Please bear in mind that most public schools are closed for winter break for a week in February, which means that kids who are entitled to a free breakfast or lunch at school may go hungry without our help.

How horrifying is that?! Are you ready to give it your all to help our community? Good! — grab your supermarket ads, your coupon envelope and tell your family, friends and neighbors! The game is ON!!

As you'll remember, we've been in a friendly competition for the last 8 years with other Presbyterian Churches. Last year's **grand total** from the 5 participating Presbyterian churches was 21,141 (food and monies combined)! (Nationwide, over \$9.6 million in food and money was collected.) CPC came in 2nd place overall with 4,150 in donations (3,260 of which was monetary donations!). First place in our hearts, of course, will always be the Freeport Emergency Food Pantry. (As a reminder, each participating church chooses its own recipient of the donations.)

This year, however, we will NOT be competing with the other churches. Betty, who has been the coordinator of this challenge for many, many, many years is in the process of retiring from the Middle Island Presbyterian Church and has stepped down as coordinator. We thank Betty for heading up this challenge every year and wish her well in her retirement! GoooooooooooooooBetty!!!

Let's not let this lack of competition amongst the other churches affect OUR giving! Let's try and pass our last year's total!

As a reminder, here's how the game works:

 Simply bring your food or money donation to church with you on Sundays or drop them off in the church office during the week. A table will be set up in the Sanctuary from Feb. 1 — March 1 to receive your donations. Money is just as good as food items, so if it's easier for you to write a check (made payable to **Community Presbyterian Church** with 'Souper Bowl of Caring' in the memo line), please feel free to do so. If you are donating actual 'cash', please hand it to one of our deacons, Pastor Moira, Gary, or Barbara in the office. If you want to make an ANONYMOUS DONATION, please just put it in an envelope marked 'Souper Bowl of Caring', and drop it in the mail slot to the office door.) Barbara will see it in the morning and add it to that week's total.

Here's a quick recap of the rules:

- Non-perishable FOOD, MONEY and SUPERMARKET GIFT CARDS will be collected during the month of February.
- The contributions are tallied as such:

february 23 — Transfiguration of the lord!



Transfiguration Sunday celebrates the glorious revelation of God in Jesus Christ and Christ's manifestation as the fulfillment of the law and the prophets. Jesus' radiant appearance on the mountaintop evokes the devouring fire of the glory of the LORD at Mount Sinai

(Exodus 24.17). Here, as at Jesus' baptism, God claims him as a beloved child, in whom God is well pleased.

In their account of this event, the synoptic gospels offer an enlightening tableau vivant, with Christ flanked by Moses, representing the law, and Elijah, representing the prophetic tradition. With this vivid image, the gospel writers demonstrate the relationship of the human Word of God to the tradition of Israel and set forth the hermeneutic by which they read the Hebrew Scriptures.

Hope of the ages

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 148-149)

The Sunday immediately prior to Ash Wednesday is an appropriate time to celebrate the Transfiguration of the Lord, because this event marked a transition in Jesus' ministry in which he "set his face to go to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51), where he would die.

In Jesus' transfiguration, we are assured that Jesus is the hope of the ages. Jesus is the One who fulfilled the Law given through Moses, the one dreamed of by the prophets, of whom Elijah is the greatest.

In celebrating this event, we rejoice in the divine majesty of Christ, whose glory shone even when confronted with the cross. It is given us for our journey through Lent toward the agony of the cross and the victory of the empty tomb. We celebrate this mystery in order that our faith may be renewed. We are transformed into the new being in Christ as we join Christ in his death and resurrection in Lent and Easter.

Ash Wednesday — February 26

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent with a public act of confession and contrition. Acknowledging that all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, we stand in solidarity as fellow



creatures before our Creator, acutely aware of our mortality. In the face of our transience, we pledge ourselves anew to live unto God's Word in Jesus Christ, the eternal Word that remains forever.

Historically, Ash Wednesday was a time when penitents were presented for church discipline during Lent, culminating in reconciliation on Maundy Thursday. Ash Wednesday is also the occasion when would-be disciples of Christ known as catechumens were enrolled in the catechumenate, a special time of learning the basics of the faith in preparation for baptism on Easter Sunday or during the Easter Vigil. In some traditions, Ash Wednesday is a fast day, beginning the Lenten time of fasting and preparation for the Great Three Days that culminate in Easter.

'A time to turn'

An excerpt from the Companion to the Book of Common Worship (Geneva Press, 2003, 109-110)

The Lenten journey from the ashes of death to resurrected life begins on the first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday, which signifies a time to turn around, to change directions, to repent. This first day of Lent reminds us that unless we are willing to die to our old selves, we cannot be raised to new life with Christ. The first step of this journey calls us to acknowledge and confront our mortality, individually and corporately. In many traditions, this is symbolized through the imposition of ashes — placing a cross on one's forehead. During the imposition of ashes the words: "You are dust, and to dust you shall return" (Genesis 3:19) are repeated again and again. We are to remember that we are but temporary creatures, always on the edge of death. On Ash Wednesday, we begin our Lenten trek through the desert toward Easter.

Ashes on the forehead is a sign of our humanity and a reminder of our mortality. Lent is not a matter of being good, and wearing ashes is not to show off one's faith. The ashes are a reminder to us and our communities of our finite creatureliness. The ashes we wear on our Lenten journey symbolize the dust and broken debris of our lives as well as the reality that eventually each of us will die.

Trusting in the "accomplished fact" of Christ's resurrection, however, we listen for the Word of God in the time-honored stories of the church's Lenten journey. We follow Jesus into the wilderness, resist temptation, fast, and proceed "on the way" to Jerusalem and the cross. Our Lenten journey is one of *metanoia* ("turning around"), of changing directions from self-serving toward the self-giving way of the cross.
